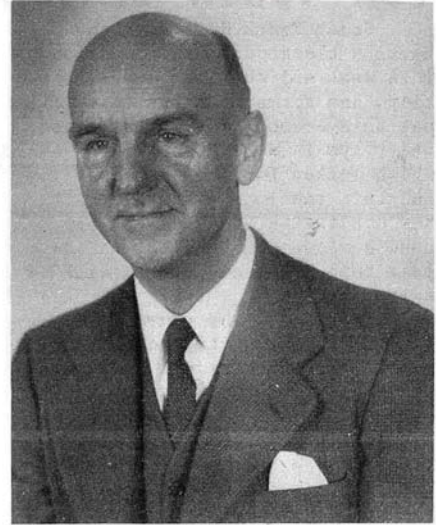

JOHNSON AND WALLACE REACH QUARTER CENTURY MARK OF SERVICE WITH NACA

Two Laboratory employees celebrate their twenty-fifth anniversary this month when they pass the quarter century of service with the Committee. This brings to 23 the number of 25-year men at the Laboratory.

William E. "Scotty" Wallace, West Machine Shop, reached the twenty-five year mark on Monday, October 11. "Scotty" was born February 20, 1881 in Norfolk, England and served his apprenticeship as a machinist in Glasgow, Scotland. Before joining the Committee's staff, he served a year and a half with the Canadian General Electric Company and fifteen years with the Newport News Shipbuilding and Dry Dock Company. He entered on duty at the Laboratory as a machinist

on October 11, 1923 and at the present time he is a Metal Model-maker Group Leader at the West Machine Shop.

Ernest Johnson, Chief of Administrative and Technical Service, will reach the quarter century mark of service with the NACA this Sunday. Johnson entered on duty at the Laboratory on October 17, 1923. After a year with the Committee, he was transferred to Flight Operations, where he remained until 1933 when he was made Chief of the Technical Service Division. In 1943 the Division was changed to Technical Service Department with Johnson in charge and in 1945 Technical Service was combined with Administrative, with Johnson remaining as head.
