FORMER EMPLOYEE DIES SUDDENL

Word has just reached the Laboratory that Frank J. Campbell, formerly of the Langley Laboratory, died suddenly last Tuesday of a heart attach in Cleveland, Ohio.

Born March 31, 1905 in Cleve-land, Ohio, Campbell entered on duty at the Langley Laboratory on February 10, 1941 as an Aviation Metalsmith. After working a year in the Erection Shop he was transferred to the East Sheetmetal Shop where he worked until he was transferred to the Lewis Laboratory in Cleveland on April 30, 1945.

While living in Hampton he and his family resided at 311 Mallory Avenue. He is survived by his wife and two children.

NEW EMPLOYEES TOUR FACILITIES

Last Tuesday morning an orientation program was conducted at the Laboratory for approximately 86 new engineers who have entered on duty. The purpose of the program was to better acquaint the new employees with the Laboratory and give them a better picture of the general nature of the work that is carried on here.

The program started in the Projection Room of the Administration Building where T. Melvin Butler, Personnel Officer, explained the organization of the NACA as a whole and of the Langley Laboratory in particular. He introduced Dr. H. J. E. Reid, Director, who welcomed the group as a part of the Laboratory's research staff. He pointed out that the NACA has grown from a group of 15 employees to approximately 7,000 and stated that each employee will be given reoponsibilities and opportunities to show his ability.

Walter Hixon, Head of Records and Transactions, explained that the Laboratory has set up a program in conjunction with the University of Virginia whereby employees may do graduate work toward a master's degree in aeronautical, mechanical, or electrical engineering. He explained further that a candidate for a masters degree is required to take 12 semester hours of credit in his major study, 9 semester hours in mathematics and physics, and 3 semester hours in a culture course or in math, physics, or the major subject. At the end of his course of study the candidate must write a thesis and pass a comprehensive examination. The deadline for registration has been extended so that new employees may take advantage of this opportunity. The


Fall Semester is tentatively scheduled to start September 26.
