

U. OF VA. APPOINTS FACULTY ADVISORS

Dr. L. R. Quarles pointed out that it will be the duty of the faculty advisors to confer with students, who will be assigned to them, and to guide them in setting up a program of study toward a de-

finite objective.

Professor Arthur F. MacConochie expressed pleasure over the progress being made by the Graduate Committee of the Engineering Department of the University of Virginia in cooperation with the Laboratory's Training Committee in setting up a program with the purpose of making the student a more valuable aeronautical research scientist and at the same (Continued on page 4)

As was announced last week, the Activities Association will sponsor a Spring Formal on Friday, May 6 at the Activities Building.



"HOUSE OF MAGIC" SET FOR APRIL

General Electric's "House of Magic", a science show which has been presented before more than 13,000,000 persons during the past fifteen years, and which was one of the hit shows of the New York World's Fair and of every major exposition since Chicago's Century of Progress, will be sponsored by the Activities Association on Thursday, April 21 at the Activities Building. Two shows will be held with one at 7 p.m. and the other

at 9 p.m.
The show, which presents in an interesting and entertaining manner the marvels of modern science, will be demonstrated by

William O. Hoverman.

Hoverman was born in Albany, N.Y. and was graduated from Brown University in 1946 with a bachelor of science degree in electrical

engineering.
During World War II, he served in the U.S. Navy for more than three years and attained the rank of ensign. He joined General Electric at Schenectady in June 1947 as a student engineer on the company's Test Course. Prior to becoming a lecturer in the G-E Advertising and Publicity Department, he worked in aeronautics and ordnance, as well as with airplane superchargers. He was recently engaged in testing work with X-ray and medical diagnostic equipment.

One of the most interesting demonstrations is that featuring the electric eye. With its aid, an electric lamp is turned on by strik-ing a match. And an electric eye attached to a loudspeaker makes it possible to "hear" light, the changes in light being heard as changes in sound.

In combination with a special lamp, music is sent across the room on a beam of light and heard at the opposite side of the room. This experiment of carrying the human voice or music on a beam of light has been performed in Sche-
