

ENGINEERS' CLUB MEETS FEBRUARY 8

Noting that the regular January meeting had been cancelled, J. J. Pohl, president of the Engineers' Club of the Virginia Peninsula, announced plans for the next five meetings. Club meeting dates have been re-arranged to accomodate several outstanding speakers who would otherwise be unavailable.

A discussion of the heat pump as a means of heating buildings will be presented on February 8 by A. Hansen of the California firm of Drayer and Hansen. This is a postwar development which acts in reverse manner to the electric refrigerator. By means of the heat pump, heat may be extracted from an underground source such as well-water and applied to heating a building. An interesting possibility in such a plant is reversing the process in summer to cool the building.

Arrangements are being made for a representative of the Radio Corporation of America to discuss recent developments in radio and television on March 3. On March 31, Dr. Kirkpatrick of the Union Pacific Railroad Company will present a talk on "The Pacific Northwest", with motion pictures. This meeting is expected to be of considerable interest, for Dr. Kirkpatrick is a popular lecturer on that region.

A talk by Dr. J. C. Perrine, assistant vice-president of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, is set for April 7. Dr. Perrine is well remembered by club members for his demonstration of the "Voder", or speech machine, before a meeting here in 1943.

Jet engines will be the subject of J. H. Collins at a date to be announced. Collins, formerly a Peninsula resident, is on the staff of the NACA Laboratory at Cleveland.



CHAIROTEERS TO PLAY SKYHAWKS

No definite date has been set as yet for the Skyhawks' game with the Chairoteers of McGuire General Hospital, according to Frank Read, Jusiness Manager of the Hawk team. Nowever, plans are still underway for the two teams to meet at the Langley Field gym within the near future for a March-of-Dimes benefit game.

Each of the Chairoteers is one of Uncle Sam's ex-GI's and are called paraplegics in the medical world to indicate paralysis of the lower half of the body.

The team has lost only one game since it was organized by Coach Clair Kaltreider, one of the McGuire staffers. Their one loss came at the hands of the equally as "handicapped" Van Nuys, California, service victims. In a recent game the Chairoteers trounced the American Legion All-Stars to the tune of 28-1.

Wheelchair basketball is a variation of regular basketball designed to enable paralyzed war veterans to play competitive basketball and the Official Basketball Rules adopted by the National Basketball Committee are used except for a few amendments and additions. Some of the rules that differ are: (1) A player is allowed two pushes on his wheels after which he must pass or dribble or violation for progress will be alled. (2) Out of bourds will

alled. (2) Out of bounds will be called on a player with the ball in his possession as soon as the wheels of his chair touch the line. (3) A player must not hold, push or deliberately ram another player's chair. Penalty is a personal foul. (4) Able bodied players may not use their feet, stand up in, or get out of their wheelchairs. Penalty is a technical foul. (5) Free throws are made with the back wheels of the player's chair on the foul line. (6) In case of a free ball and opposing players are wheeling to gain possession, a jump ball will be called immediately. This eliminates the danger of injury to a player's hand were he to be run into by an opposing player while reaching for the ball. (7) Play stops immediately if a disabled player falls out of his wheelchair. Play continues if an able bodied player's wheelchair upsets.
