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EDUCATION PROGRAM OFFERS NEW COURSES

Many new courses will be organized during January under the Vocational and Adult Education program at Hampton High School, it was announced this week. In the field of practical arts a new section of sewing will be started. This group will be in operation two nights a week for a total of 50 hours.

Business courses which will begin in the near future include typing for elementary, intermediate and advanced students, shorthand classes for as many as three levels of work, and a course in bookkeeping on the elementary level. It will be necessary for intermediate and advanced shorthand students to fill in a questionnaire at the time of registration in order to assist the night school office in organizing its classes.

A new course in English, designated as applied English (including business use), is also scheduled to start in January.

In the field of high school mathematics, courses are being planned for algebra, geometry, and trigonometry. The number of sections of mathematics courses to be organized will be governed by the demand for this type of training.

All of the courses included in this list will meet on Monday and Thursday evenings and, with the exception of the course in sewing, are scheduled to meet for two hours beginning at 7 p.m.

Persons interested may contact the N.C.A Training Office, telephone 2256 and request that their names be placed on the class roster. However, it will be necessary for registration fees to be paid at the registration desk at Hampton High School. Starting dates for the courses will be announced as soon as possible. This will be determined by the promptness in registering.

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plan to or are training their sons and daughters to handle guns, has been promised by the Sporting Arms and Ammunition Manufacturers' Institute. The film is entitled "The Making of a Shooter" and covers the proper handling of firearms in the field, on the range, and at the traps. The action is built around a young boy whose father, a doctor kept at home by his professional duties, sends the boy to attend the country's three outstanding shooting events - the Grand American Trapshooting Tournament, the National Skeet Shooting Championships, and the National Rifle Matches. The boy is presented with letters to several of his dad's friends, leading contestants at these shoots, asking them to give the boy a few pointers on their various specialties.

The boy is then shown visiting these events and being instructed in the safe use of shotgun and rifle by such champions as Ned Lilly, Dick Shaughnessy and Thurman Randle. These sequences were made on the spot at the 1941 national shooting events. The pictorial effect of the early scenes is enhanced by the presence of the boy's pretty sister who accompanies him on his jaunt to Camp Perry.

Later sequences show the boy hunting with his dad for upland birds, waterfowl, and big game. The motion picture is in full color.
