X-RAY SURVEY NOW UNDERWAY


The 1948 X-ray survey of Laboratory employees got underway Tuesday, July 27. At 10 a.m. Wesnesday 750 East Area employees had reported to the clinic room for examination. The survey in East Area was scheduled to continue through Thursday afterneon and approximately 1200 employees were expected to aveil themselves of the service.

On Monday, August 2, the unit will be set up at the Vallops Isnald Station and will return to Langley Field on Tuesday for examination of West Area personnel. The clinic in the West Area will be held in the Morale Activities Building on Tuesday, Weunesday, and Thursday morning of next week.

Shown above is the NC-4 erriving at Lisbon, Portugal, May 27, 1919, after completing the first trans-Atlantic flight, with an intermediate stop at the Azores. The NC-4 dubbed "Lame Duck" by the press because of a forced landing off Chatham, Mass., was the only one of three chips to complete the flight. The second day of the flight, a thick fog settled in and both the NC-1 and NC-3 alighted on the water to take bearings. Hugh waves prevented their rising again. The total airline distance of the flight was 3,936 nautical miles and total flying time was 52 hours, 31 minutes.

FALL SEMESTER BEGINS SEPT. 13

The 1948 Fall Semester of evening undergraduate engineering extension courses, under the sponsorshop of the University of Virginia, will begin on September 13 at the Hampton High School.

Classes will meet two hours each week from 7 to 9 p.m. for 16 weeks. Since the building will be open on two nights each week, it will be possible to enroll in two courses. Each course will carry two semester hours of undergraduate credit.

For the benefit of those persons interested in the program of graduate studies, also aponsored by the University of Virginia, there are several courses being offered which are listed as prerequisites in the graduate curricular. The courses are: fundamentals of aeronautical engineering, elementary engineering thermodynamics, mechanical and strength of materials, and ordinary differential equations. Other courses are: trigonometry, college albebra, analytical geometry, calculus (differential), calculus (integral), calculus (review), physics (heat, light, and sound), physics (electricity and magnetiam), radar, guided missiles and jet propulsion, electronics for mechanical engineers, technical German, elementary fluid mechanics, and descriptive geometry.

The course in radar, guided missiles and jet propulsion is especially designed for employees of the Library, Editorial Office, sterographers for Division Chiefs, etc. and will include selected topics in order to familiarize the student with the technical terms and basic fundamentals in the above fields.

A fee of \$20 will be charged for each course, payable to the collectors not later than the first meeting of each class. Veterans who enroll in these courses may have their tuition paid and textbooks furnished under Public Law 346 or

The Fourth United States Civil Service Region has announced an examination for Clerk, CAF-5 and CAF-6, for probational appointments. This examination is assembled. The following options are covered by the examination: general clerical and administrative, qualifications ratings, appointment and status changes, correspondence, mail and file, printing and publications, surplus property disposal, traffic management, cash accounting, commercial accounting and auditing, fiscal accounting and auditing, time and leave, payroll, military payroll, information and and editorial, and statistical.

Applicants must indicate the option for which they are applying. The option should be indicated on Form 57 which will be executed at the time of the written test. Applicants desiring to apply for more than one option must fill out a separate Form 57 for each.

Those who qualify in these examinations may be given a probational appointment leading to a permanent Civil Service status. Those employed under war service or temporary appointments in these positions, who desire to receive probation appointments to their present positions, should apply.


