



36 GOLFERS ENTER NACA TOURNAMENT

The annual "Air Scoop" championship golf tournament will begin the week of June 6 and 36 golfers will battle it out for the laurels in three flights.

Matches must be completed during the week designated as follows: First round- June 6-12; second round June 13-19; third round- June 20-26 and finals June 27.

Due to the illness of the "Air Scoop" editor, a printed list of instructions will not be available, but U. S. Golf Association rules will apply to the tournament. A ball may be picked up on the green for marking or cleaning purposes and one's lie on the fairway may be improved with the club head.

Before beginning a match, the players are requested to report to the Hampton Country Club pro. Score cards should be turned in to the club pro immediately after each match. Players are urged especially to turn in complete cards on their first rounds in order to be eligible for the "blind" prize which will be determined on the basis of the total score carded on four "secret" holes.

TWO COMMITTEE MEMBERS NAMED

Delos W. Rentzel, newly appointed CAA Administrator, was sworn in Friday as a Member of the NACA.

Dr. T. P. Wright, former CAA head, whose place on the NACA is taken by Rentzel, will be re-sworn in as a Member from private life in the place of the late Dr. Orville Wright, inventor of the airplane.

Rentzel is from Houston, Texas and a graduate of A & M College of Texas. He served in the Radio Division of the U.S. Navy from 1929 to 1931 and was named consultant to the Secretary of War for establishment of the Atlantic radio communication system during World War II. He also served as a communications consultant with the second Byrd South Pole Mission in 1943. A widely-known executive in the aeronautical radio industry, Rentzel is a Fellow of the Institute of the Aeronautical Sciences and a Member of the Society of Automotive Engineers.

SECURITY LOAN DRIVE UNDER WAY

The Security Loan Drive is now in full swing at the Laboratory and Arthur Samet, campaign chairman, has indicated that employees here have shown an encouraging spirit of cooperation in the effort thus far to realize a decided improvement in the Lab's record of bond purchases through the pay roll plan.

The Morale Activities Association offered its support to the Security Loan Campaign this week by announcing that it would donate a prize to the group of employees here who make the best showing in pay roll bond buying during the drive. Samet said that the Lab employees would be divided into various groups for purposes of the contest and announced that the groupings and other contest details would be made known next week.

In the meantime, two types of memoranda are being circulated among Laboratory employees. One is being distributed to non-subscribers, requesting their serious consideration in making bond purchases through the pay roll plan; the other is going to employees who are already buying bonds through the pay roll plan, requesting them to increase their allotments.

The Security Loan Drive is being conducted at the request of President Truman. Leon J. Markham of the Treasury Department, who is serving as director of pay roll savings, pointed out that the campaign is important for a number of reasons, three of them being: (1) to make it easy for millions of Americans to continue their habit of regular saving from current income; (2) to spread the ownership of our national debt among as many wage earners as possible through the sale to them of Government bonds; and (3) to help wage earners build a nest egg of savings for their own future.
